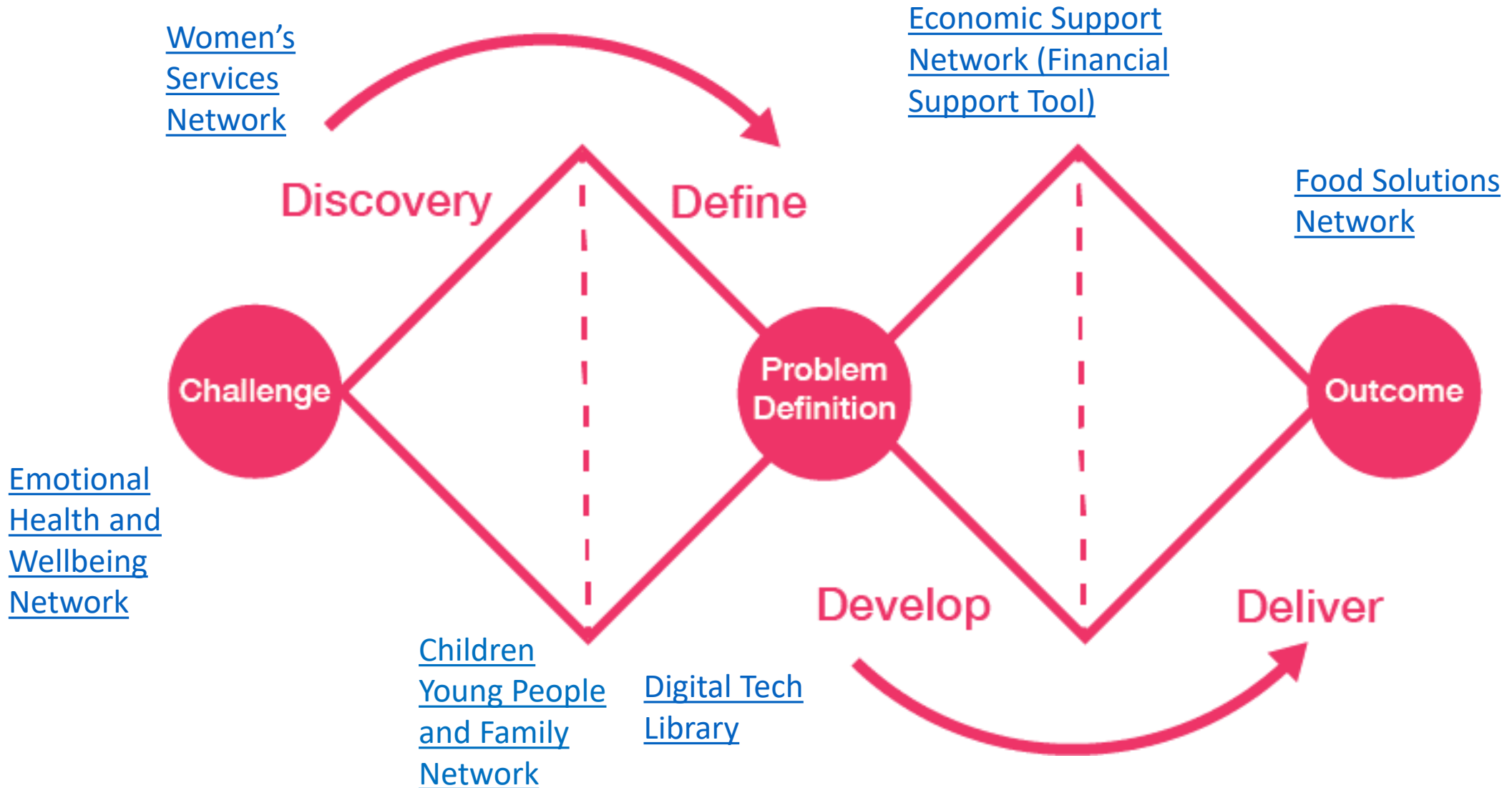
Thematic Collaboration

Which stage are our Collaboration Networks at?

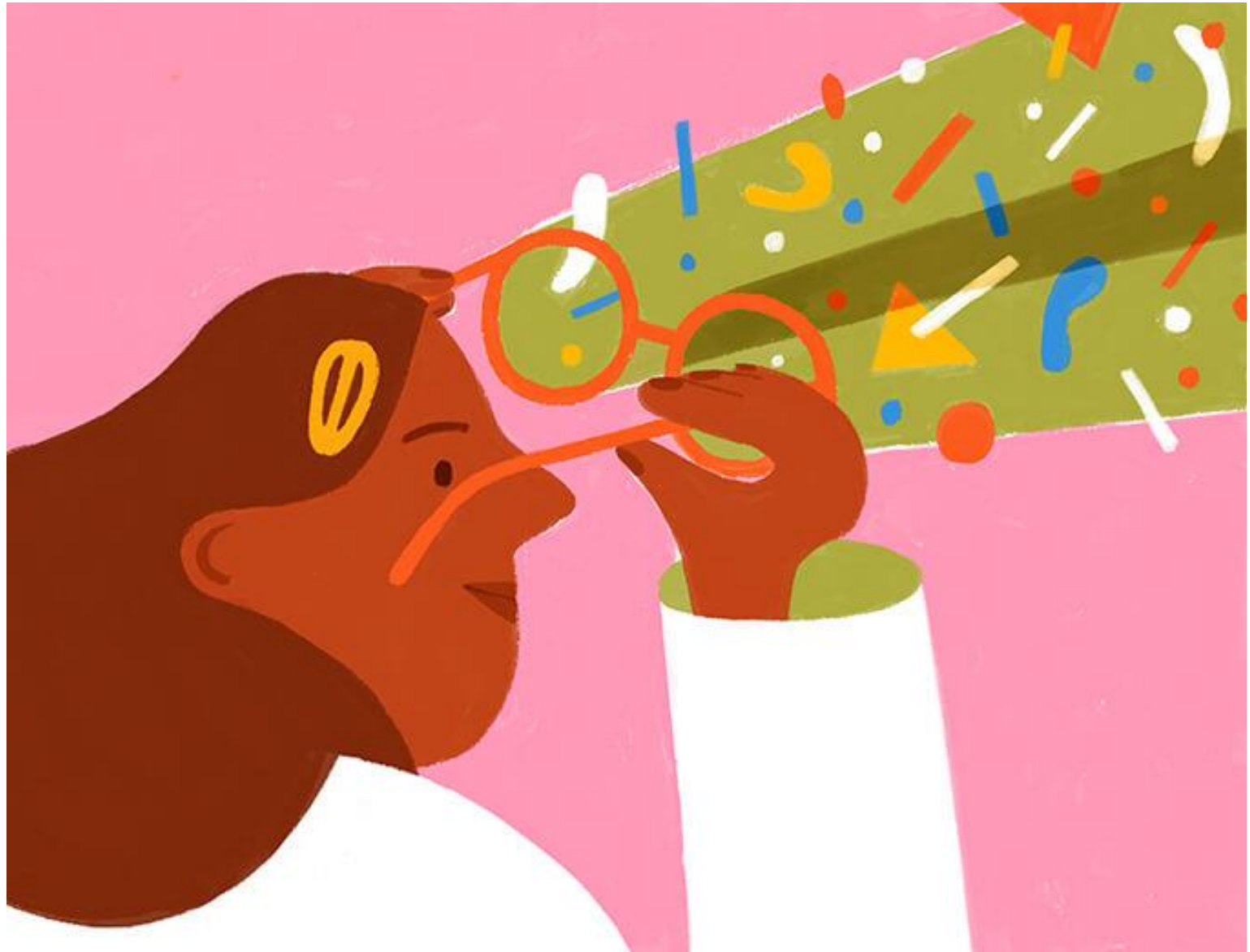


Change-makers

We know citizens, young people, parents, carers, volunteers, children and activists see the world from valuable perspectives and can enrich this programme.

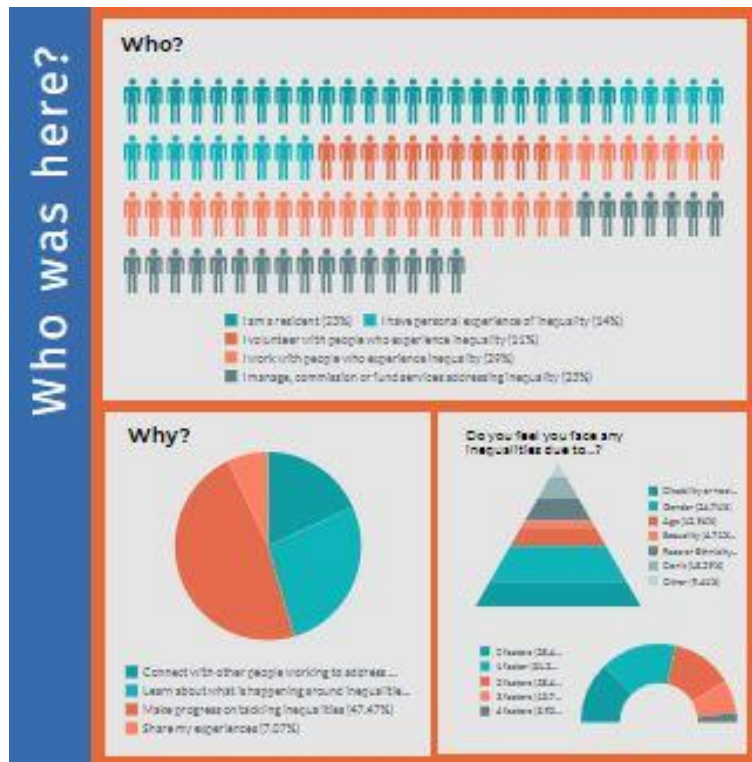
Through 2021 we will have 30 places available on a **Citizen Leadership course** which has been developed by [Collaborate Out Loud](#).
